Pandemic BT

Important information for parents or guardians of student's eligible for Free and Reduced Lunch at Lakewood High School.

What is the Pandemic-EBT Program?

The Pandemic-EBT (P-EBT) Program gives food benefits to families with children who were not able to get free or reduced-price school meals due to COVID. You may hear about this benefit from other schools or in the media.

Who is eligible?

Being eligible for this program will depend on what school your student attends. Eligibility for the Pandemic-EBT (P-EBT) Program can be different between schools within the same district.

What makes a school eligible for P-EBT?

A school building is eligible only if the building has had 5 school days in a row of reduced in-person hours due to COVID.

What could make my student eligible for P-EBT?

- 1) If the school they attend is eligible for P-EBT and
- 2) If your student normally gets free and reduced meals at school and
- 3) If your student is not getting instruction in-person for some or all the month.

<u>The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) issues P-EBT benefits</u> <u>based on:</u>

- •How each school building reports their eligibility
- How most of the students attend school during the month

There may be months when your student's attendance was different from what the school reported. In that case, you may be able to have your student's benefit level reconsidered. Your request to be reconsidered must be submitted by June 30, 2021. In the month(s) below

your school reported primarily in-person. Your student(s) may be P-EBT eligible if they attended class on-line, for some time or all the time in the following month(s):

October 2020, January 2021, February 2021, March 2021, and April 2021

- □ Congratulations to all of our students who have been accepted into their chosen **Eaton RESA programs for the Fall of 2021**. Keep in mind that in order for you to be eligible for Eaton RESA you must be on track towards graduation. If you have any classes that you still need to complete on Edgenuity they MUST be completed by July 3rd, 2021. Therefore, if you don't complete them by the last day of school you must attend summer school until the class or classes that you need to make up are completed.
- □ Class of 2022 If you have not started already, now is the time to think about your AFTER high school plans. Will you be going to college 2 year or 4 year? Going to a trade or tech school? Going into the military? What is out there, what do you want/don't want to do, and how you can make this happen? Your School Counselors are here to assist you in many ways:

Students can request to meet with your school counselor by completing a purple meeting request form in the Counseling Office (for remote students, contact your school counselor by email.) Your school counselor is available to meet with you about:

- Academics: your 4-year plan of classes, your schedule, a study plan for a class you are struggling with, options such as Eaton RESA, dual enrollment, AP classes, work-based experience, credit recovery, and other
- Social/Emotional: concerns about a friendship or other relationship, to discuss mental health such as stress and anxiety, and other concerns that may be bothering you
- Career/College: developing your plans for after high school (college, tech school, military, and other) as well as questions you have about what you will be doing next and what you need to do to achieve those goals


